Pressure grows over timing of election

Green Party leader rebuked for suggesting November 29th as possible polling day

Tánaiste calls for clarity on election date but 'this is something' for talks next week

The leaders of the Coalition parties will discuss the timing of the general election on Monday evening with expectations growing that a date at the end of November – or possibly early December – will be chosen as polling day.

November 29th was suggested yesterday by the Green Party leader, Roderic O'Gorman, much to the annoyance of Fine Gael, who pointed out it was the Taoiseach's constitutional prerogative to call the election.

Meanwhile, a senior Fine Gael figure said it was now "almost guaranteed" that the election would not be held on the 29th due to Mr O'Gorma announced next week

Other sources said that they did not expect any announcement on Monday, but that the leaders would look at the practicalities of clearing the decks for an election.

State may sign up to 'Iron Dome' defence system

Ireland may join a planned international missile defence system, which has been dubbed "a European Iron Dome", under plans being considered by officials.

The European Sky Shield Initiative (ESSI) is aimed at significantly upgrading the air and missile defences of European countries. Polish prime minister Donald Tusk recently likened it to Iron Dome, Israel's anti-missile system.

Germany established the ESSI in 2022 in response to Russia's devastating long-range missile attacks on Ukraine. It will allow countries to jointly procure advanced air defence systems and co-ordinate their use.

The possibility of Ireland joining the ESSI is one option being considered by a civil and military team of Irish defence planners. It is one of several proposals aimed at dramatically improving Ireland's negligible air defences.

Any decision to join the ESSI would likely be highly controversial, given the State's position of "military neutrality". which is based on non-membership of common defence organisations such as Nato.

Sources point out that Switzerland and Malta, both neutral countries, have recently signed up to the ESSI and that the system is intended to be defensive in nature.
