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Report: Trump sees PM's Doha strike as attempt to derail talks

Muslim and Arab states to convene in Doha Sunday to discuss measures against Israel

The leaders of Muslim and Arab states will convene in Doha Sunday to discuss legal and diplomatic measures in response to the Israeli airstrike in the Qatari capital last week. Participants, including the heads of Egypt, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and the Palestinian Authority, are expected to discuss ways to create leverage against the Trump administration to prevent similar attacks in the future and to demand the president's direct involvement in ending the war in Gaza.

This comes as Trump and his top aides are concerned Israel's strike against Hamas leaders in Qatar may have derailed ceasefire talks, Politico reported on Friday, citing two sources close to Trump.

Doha remains the principal mediator in Israel and Hamas' cease-fire and hostage deal negotiations: Israel has said the strike on Tuesday targeted Hamas officials. The officials were reportedly part of the ceasefire delegation.

"Every time they're making progress, it seems like he bombs someone," a person close to Trump's national security team told Politico. "That's why the president and his aides are so frustrated with Netanyahu." But the source said they were unaware of U.S. plans to penalize Israel.

Oatar and other Arab countries condemned the

strike, and it is unclear whether Qatar or the U.S. received prior warning. An American defense official told Politico the Israeli warning was inadequate.

"The vague notice given was wholly insufficient [and] lacked the specifics needed to adequately warn which he described as a regional partners," they said. A phone call between Trump and Netanyahu after the strike was "heated," the person close to the national

security team said. Trump said he was unhappy with Israel's strike,

A Qatari official told Politico the talks were on hold. "When one party chooses to bomb the mediator and one of the negotiating delegations, what kind of talks can be considered valid?" he said.

Official sources in Doha said the emergency gathering of Muslim and Arab states will examine ways to strengthen regional security mechanisms, expand political and economic cooperation between countries and increase international pressure for a cease-fire.

DF nearly doubles 'safe zones' for civilians in Gaza

Hostage relatives accuse PM of blowing up chance of deal

Family members of hostages condemned Israel's strike targeting the Hamas negotiating team in Qatar last week, accusing Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of purposefully blocking an end to the war and the return of their loved ones in the Gaza Strip.

"This week, we witnessed a magnificent failure by the prime minister, when he took a gamble on the lives of the hostages, and tried to eliminate the Hamas negotiating team while they were discussing a deal to release my son," said Einav Zangauker, mother of hostage

Matan, on Saturday ahead of the weekly rally at Tel Aviv's Hostage Square.

Zangauker quoted U.S. President Donald Trump, who said that "Every time they're making progress, it seems like he [Netanyahu] bombs someone," and added, "But he didn't try to bomb the leaders of Hamas, but the families' chance to get their loved ones back."

Zangauker said if Netanyahu had listened to other security officials, "he could have avoided this failure and not blown up the deal. However, Netanyahu will blow up everything that leads to

UN approves French-Saudi proposal for two-state solution

The United Nations General Assembly voted on Friday to endorse the New York Declaration on the implementation of the two-state

A resolution endorsing the declaration of a twostate solution for Israel and Palestinians received 142 votes in favor and 10 votes against it. Twelve countries abstained from voting.

Of the European countries, Hungary is the only one that opposed the resolution, and the Czech Republic abstained. All other European countries voted in favor.

Following the vote, French President Emmanuel Macron posted on X, "An-

other future is possible. Two

peoples, two States: Israel and Palestine, living side by side in peace and security.'

The Foreign Ministry wrote that it "utterly rejects the decision" in an X post by the ministry's spokesperson, who called the General Assembly "a political circus detached from reality."

"There is no reference to the simple fact that Hamas is solely responsible for the continuation of the war, through its refusal to return the hostages and disarm," the statement added, saying that the resolution "encourages Hamas to continue the war."

Hours later, the U.S. delegation to the UN released a statement reiterating its opposition to the proposal,

The Israel Defense Forces has almost doubled the area designated for civilians throughout the Gaza Strip, according to a statement issued Friday morning by the IDF Arabic Spokesman Avichay Adraee.

The statement said that Gaza City residents are now permitted to stay in camps in central Gaza, south of the city, and not only in the Muwasi area further south, as

previously ordered. The Hamas-run Gaza Health Ministry said Saturday that 47 people were killed and 205 wounded by IDF fire in the past 24 hours, including five killed and 26 wounded while seeking aid.

The ministry also re-

ported that seven people, including two children, died of hunger or malnutrition, bringing the total number of deaths from hunger and malnutrition since the start

of the war to 420. Since October 7, the IDF killed 64,803 people and wounded 164,264 across the Strip, the statement read. The IDF said it had struck

a high-rise in Gaza City

Saturday, which it said was used by Hamas. Footage indicates that the building targeted was a residential building in the Tel al-Hawa neighborhood.

On Saturday, the IDF posted a message on X addressing Gaza City residents, claiming that over 250,000 people have fled the city for their safety and directing them to the IDF's

newly-designated "humanitarian zones."

An analysis conducted by Prof Yaakov Jerome Garb of Ben-Gurion University found that the area in which civilians are permitted to stay has increased from 43 square kilometers (16.6 square miles) to 78 square kilometers - 21 percent of

the entire Gaza Strip area. In his Friday statement,

Adraee also published a list that includes all areas in which Gaza City residents can receive shelter, "as part of the IDF's efforts to provide necessary information to Gaza residents, to ensure

their protection.' The list includes the areas of Nuseirat, Bureij, Zawaida and Deir al-Balah, as well

Clash between two ministers stalls production of key defense systems

Production of critical defense systems for Israel has been delayed for months due to a dispute between Defense Minister Israel Katz and Minister David Amsalem, both members of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's Likud.

Although the government approved the systems and allocated funding, the conflict between Katz and Amsalem, whose ministerial portfolio includes overseeing the Government Companies Authority, has blocked production by Israel Aerospace Industries.

Their power struggle has prevented the appointment of external directors to IAI, halting the signing of two key contracts with the state, including the deal for these specialized security systems.

This is not the first time Israel's procurement of advanced military technology has been delayed: a May investigation by Haaretz revealed that Netanyahu postponed groundbreaking capabilities for years, intended for potential use against Iran.
